



The absence of a major sports team in New York's capital makes Saints hoops one of the top tickets in the Albany area. The Saints enjoy a healthy home-court advantage at the Times Union Center, a rowdy following and consistently solid coaching—a formula that's spurred Siena to NCAA Tournament wins in 1989 (over Stanford), 2008 (Vanderbilt) and 2009 (Ohio State).

BEST TEAM: 1988-89 The Saints' 25-5 record and run to the NCAA Tournament's second round is all the more remarkable considering that an on-campus measles outbreak forced them to play nine games in empty arenas and cancel two others they almost certainly would have won (Brooklyn, Northeastern).

BEST PLAYER: G MARC BROWN (1987-91) Quick, competitive and a terrific ballhandler, "Showbiz" was a natural for Mike Deane's guard-oriented system. As a senior, he earned MAAC Player of the Year honors, and he finished his career as one of only three D1 players to record 2,000 points and 750 assists.

BEST COACH: MIKE DEANE (1986-94) As hands-on as they come, Deane dictated that the Saints offense be controlled through the point guard and Brown obliged, resulting in NIT and NCAA Tournament victories.

GAME FOR THE AGES: Many Saints fans assumed Siena's 80-78 upset of Stanford in the 1989 NCAA Tournament would never be topped. But the 2008-09 team did just that with its first-round, 74-72 victory over No. 8-seed Ohio State on March 20. Ronald Moore hit a three to tie it late in the first OT, then nailed the game-winner with 3.9 seconds left in the second overtime—from nearly the same spot.

FIERCEST RIVAL: Siena has ended Marist's season in the MAAC tournament five times between 1999 and 2007—a fittingly bitter twist to this rivalry. A brawl between the teams during the 1983-84 season forced a three-year hiatus in the series. When it was renewed in 1987, Siena went on the road to face 7'4" Rik Smits and possibly the best Marist team ever. The outcome? An 87-66 Siena victory. The Saints lead overall, 41-22.
