ESPN TULSA

That do Nolan Richardson, Tubby Smith and Bill Self have in common? As any Golden Hurricane fan knows, they all made stops in Tulsa before winning a national title elsewhere. The Hurricane's recent coaching lineage, which also includes J.D. Barnett, Steve Robinson, Buzz Peterson, John Phillips and now Doug Wojcik, is a huge reason why Tulsa ranks among the Southwest's best teams of the past three decades, with 19 postseason trips since 1981.

BEST TEAM: 1999-2000 No pain, no gain. The Golden Hurricane's four regular-season losses (three to Fresno State) all came on the last possession, which toughened them up for a magical Tournament run. Despite starting just one player over 6'5", Self's balanced squad blew through UNLV, Cincinnati and Miami before going down in the Elite Eight to North Carolina, 59-55.

BEST PLAYER: G SHEA SEALS (1993-97)

Tulsa had never won a Tournament game before Seals arrived. All the shooting guard did was lead the team to four straight Big Dances, including Sweet 16 appearances in 1994 and '95. He also finished as the school's all-time leading scorer while playing airtight defense. Almost 10 years after his final game, Seals kept his promise to his mom and received his degree from Tulsa in 2006.

BEST COACH: NOLAN RICHARDSON (1980-85) Tulsa took a chance on Richardson after he led Western Texas

to a national junior college title in 1980, and reaped the benefits immediately by winning the 1981 NIT title over Syracuse. Three NCAA Tournament trips and a second NIT bid followed. Richardson donned polka-dot shirts and cowboy boots, and developed the up-tempo offense and pressure defense that would become his trademark. In 1994, he used it to guide Arkansas to the national title.

GAME FOR THE AGES: Tubby's team nearly blew its chance of making the 1994 Tournament by losing in the Missouri Valley tournament semis, but snuck in as a No. 12 seed. After beating UCLA in the first round, the Hurricane rallied from a 13-point first-half deficit to beat No. 4-seed Oklahoma State, 82-80. Point guard Alvin "Pooh" Williamson played a nearly perfect game, scoring 20 points and committing zero turnovers. Leading by one, teammate Lou Dawkins hit a three-pointer with 8.6 seconds left to seal Tulsa's first Sweet 16 appearance. The win avenged a 73-61 regular-season loss to the Cowboys.

HEARTBREAKER: In the 2003 Tournament, Tulsa appeared headed to its fourth Sweet 16 in ten seasons, leading Big Ten champion Wisconsin by 13 with 4:08 left. But the Badgers closed the game on a 16-2 run, capped by Freddie Owens' three-pointer with one tick left. The Hurricane actually had time for one more miracle play, but the game ended when Jarius Glenn stepped over the line on his inbounds pass.

FIERCEST RIVAL: In the annual battle for the Mayor's Cup, Tulsa leads crosstown foe Oral Roberts, 29-16, an edge made all the more bitter for Golden Eagles fans by the fact that their rival

hired Bill Self away from ORU in 1997. Each victory invariably sets off a spirited postgame celebration by the winning team and their fans, in which the cup is hoisted high and passed proudly from player to player.

FANFARE AND HOOPLA: You won't find two crazier college basketball fans than Ken Penn and David Bales-better known as Mad Dog and Coach. Penn has been coming to games since 1977, and wears a rubber snout and barks at opponents. Meanwhile, Bales dresses up in a suit and tie, screams at officials and paces the Tulsa sideline.

FAN FAVORITE: G RONDIE TURNER (1981-84) He scored just 16 career points, but no one got the crowd fired up like this scrappy guard and ordained minister.
