

2015 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament

#1 South Carolina 58, #9 Arkansas 36

SOUTH CAROLINA NOTES

- South Carolina is now 28-2 overall, 9-23 all-time in the SEC Tournament.
- The Gamecocks advance to face the winner of Texas A&M-LSU in the semifinal on Saturday.
- South Carolina's winning margin of 22 points marked the eighth SEC game this year with a 20+ margin for the Gamecocks.
- 58 points ties USC's season-low for points in an SEC victory, after defeating Georgia, 58-35, on Feb. 5.
- The Gamecocks outrebounded the Razorbacks, 44-32. USC has won the rebounding battle against every SEC opponent this season and has done so by 10+ rebounds in 16 games.
- Junior guard Tiffany Mitchell led South Carolina in scoring for the 13th time this season with 12 points, her 25th double-figure game this season.
- Sophomore center Alaina Coates scored 11 for her 18th game in double figures.
- Senior center Elem Ibiam was the Gamecocks' leading rebounder with nine, just the second time she has led the team this year.
- South Carolina's bench outscored its Arkansas counterparts 27-3, and dominated points in the paint, 40-6.

ARKANSAS NOTES

- Arkansas is now 17-13 on the year, 11-24 all-time in the SEC Tournament.
- This was Arkansas' first loss to South Carolina in the SEC Tournament, having entered the matchup 2-0 against the Gamecocks in the event.
- Sophomore forward Jessica Jackson led Arkansas with 13 points, her 23rd double-figure game this season and 10th in a row.
- Despite being outrebounded overall, the Razorbacks had the edge in offensive boards, 14-13.
- The 11 field goals scored by Arkansas were a season low and a new SEC Tournament record. The previous low in the event was 14 on 12 occasions.
- Arkansas set a season low in field goal percentage at 19.3 percent (11-57). The Razorbacks shot 22.6 percent in the first half (7-31), but was just 4 of 26 (15.4 percent) in the second period.
- The Razorbacks' 19.3 percent from the field is the lowest in the history of the SEC Tournament, breaking the previous record of 22.2 percent set by Alabama (vs. Ole Miss) in 1990 and Georgia (vs. Kentucky) in 2013.
