TOURNAMENT NOTES

MISSOURI NOTES

- Missouri fell to 24-7 on the season and 1-6 all-time in SEC Tournament play after capturing their first ever win in Thursday's game.
- The Tigers' offense hit 16-of-59 from the field, for a season-low 27.1%. Their previous low also happened against Georgia when the Tigers connected on 27.6% of shot attempts.
- The 23 first half Missouri points were one short of the season-low set against both LSU and Saint Louis. The 41 final points were their lowest of the season.
- Senior forward Jordan Frericks moved into second place on the Missouri all-time rebound leaderboard with six in the game, passing Kesha Bonds' 1,021 boards. Frericks also fouled out for the 26th time in her collegiate career.
- The Tigers took a 23-20 lead into the half, losing just their second game when holding an advantage at the break (2-20).
- Sophomore Cierra Porter contributed nine points in her 89th career Mizzou start and reached double-figures in rebounding (12).
- Junior guard Sophie Cunningham hit her second-lowest field-goal percentage of the season with a 3-for-17 night (17.6%).

GEORGIA NOTES

- Georgia is now 25-5 on the season, 48-34 all-time in the SEC Tournament.
- The 25 wins for UGA are the most in a season since the 2012-13 Bulldogs finished 28-7 under Andy Landers.
- The Bulldogs held Missouri to 41 points and are now 25-0 under head coach Joni Taylor when holding an opponent under 50 points.
- The 41 points allowed were the fewest by an SEC opponent against Georgia this season.
- Georgia also limited the Tigers to 27.1% shooting, improving to 22-2 in Taylor's tenure when holding an opponent to under 40% from the field.
- The 20 points scored in the first half tied for the second-lowest point output in a half for Georgia. The Bulldogs scored 20 points in each half of a 49-43 OT win over Alabama on Feb 22. UGA's lowest scoring half was 19 in the opening half against Tennessee on Feb. 11.
- Junior forward Kayla Robinson scored six points to cross the 1,000-point plateau for her career. She has now scored 1,002 points.
