

# Nine for IX Film Discussion Guide: No Limits

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- Discuss examples in the film where freedivers state that freediving is more about mental capacity, rather than physical skills. What aspects of mental toughness do free divers need to succeed? Discuss if and how the mind can overcome physical limits of the body. What positive lessons can be learned from the mental toughness of extreme sport athletes?
- 2. Alternatively, some scholars argue that extreme sport athletes like freedivers engage in a form of deviance called "the sport ethic." Analyze freedivers using the concept of the sport ethic.
- 3. In the film Tanya Streeter and Audrey Mestre were characterized and "young and sexy" women rivals which was good for the sport and brought unprecedented visibility to freediving. How did Streeter and Mestre benefit and how were they exploited? What role did the rivalry with Tanya Streeter have in the success, and the eventual death, of Audrey Mestre?
- 4. On espnW.com the filmmaker of *No Limits*, Allison Ellwood, states the most haunting question for her in the making of the film was: *If Pipin was so deeply in love with her, as he claimed in the book, why did he push her so hard to make such a dangerous dive for which his team was ill-prepared and under-financed?* What are your thoughts on the role of Pipin Ferreras, Audrey's husband, in her death? According to those interviewed for the film, what could have been done to manage risk and increase the likelihood of a successful dive?







- 5. Before watching this film, had you ever heard of or seen freediving covered in the media? Freediving is one of the few sports where men and women compete by the exact same rules and gender differences in performance and <u>world records</u> are relatively small. Can you think of sports where the rules for participation are a) different and, b) the same for men and women? Can you think of other sports where the performance are large? Which sports (gender similar or gender different) are most valued, popular, deemed legitimate and covered by the media in US society? How might sport popularity be related to gender and power?
- 6. In the film, the ghost writer Linda Robertson of *The Dive*, Pipin Ferreras' autobiography, said she found Ferreras "an unreliable narrator" because she didn't believe half of what he said. What do you make of the fact Ferreras refused to be interviewed for the film and how do you reconcile his characterizations in the film?
- 7. In free diving, as with many other sports, there are many husband-coach/wife-athlete duos, as evidenced in the film by Ferreras and Mestre, as well as Tanya and Paul Streeter. What might be the potential ethical issues and up- and downsides of having a husband-coach/wife-athlete relationship in high level competitive sports? How might a young female athlete be vulnerable with an older male coach within the coach-athlete relationship?
- 8. For many extreme sports, the majority of participants are White males. Scholars argue this makes inclusion for females and non-White males difficult. Based on who was interviewed for film and the participants you saw, does this hold true for freediving?
- 9. What are the moral implications related to an extreme sport athlete risking their own life, while in course incurring cost and potential harm to others, such as families, rescue workers, and society at large? What should the balance be between autonomy and doing what is best for others?
- 10. Can you think of examples in other sports where the Key Concepts listed at the beginning of this guide are present?
