



GONZAGA

Once the quintessential Cinderella team, Gonzaga in recent years has recast itself as not just a party crasher at the Big Dance, but a regularly invited, elite-level program. Between 1999 and 2009, the Bulldogs made 11 straight Tournament appearances.

BEST TEAM: 1998-99 These Zags became the darlings of college basketball. Led by three of the school's all-time leading scorers—Matt Santangelo, Richie Frahm and Casey Calvary—Gonzaga finished 28–7 for head coach Dan Monson. As a No. 10 seed in the Tournament, Gonzaga beat Minnesota, Stanford and Florida before falling to eventual national champion Connecticut in the Elite Eight—the Zags' deepest run ever.

BEST PLAYER: G JOHN STOCKTON (1980-84) The player most identified with the Gonzaga program, Stockton was the first Bulldog to eclipse 1,000 points and 500 assists during his career. Stockton's 1,340 points place him among the school's Top 20 scorers, and he is fourth on the Zags' assist list with 554. As a senior, he was the West Coast Athletic Conference Player of the Year. Along with Frank Burgess, Stockton is one of just two Bulldogs to have their numbers retired. The 16th pick in the first round of the 1984 NBA draft, he was a 10-time All-Star in his 19 seasons with the Jazz.

BEST COACH: MARK FEW (1999-) After 10 years as an assistant coach, Few has compiled a 10-year head coaching record of 264–66 and has made the NCAA Tournament in every season, with four Sweet 16 runs to his credit. His .800

winning percentage is the highest among all who have coached Gonzaga for more than one season.

GAME FOR THE AGES: With a trip to the Elite Eight on the line on March 18, 1999, No. 10-seed Gonzaga locked horns with No. 6-seed Florida. With his team leading by a point, Florida's Brent Wright was called for traveling while trying to call a timeout with :15 left. The Zags put the ball in the hands of diminutive guard Quentin Hall, who hoisted a shot from the lane that bounced off the rim, only to be tipped in by a charging Casey Calvary with 4.4 seconds left, clinching the game for the Zags, 73-72. Frahm led the Zags with 17 points and four assists and Santangelo added seven assists of his own.

HEARTBREAKER: While they've suffered their share of gut-wrenching Tournament exits, the most enduring image of Gonzaga heartbreak is that of All-America Adam Morrison sitting on the floor, head buried between his knees, crying after the 73-71 Sweet 16 loss to UCLA in 2006. The Zags led by 13 at halftime and by nine with just over three minutes to go. But UCLA closed with an 11-0 run, seizing the lead for the only time in the game with :10 left.

FIERCHEST RIVAL: Each renewal is known simply as the Game. Gonzaga and Washington State have met 144 times and WSU holds a 97–47 edge. But Gonzaga has been the power in recent seasons, having won eight of ten between 1998-99 and 2008-09.

FANFARE AND HOOPLA: Technically, the McCarthey Athletic Center replaced Kennedy Pavilion as the Zags' home

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court in 2004, but in local parlance, that's when the team moved from the Kennel to the New Kennel. Both arenas have been headquarters for the rowdy student bunch called the Kennel Club, whose fervor has helped Gonzaga to eight undefeated home campaigns since 1992-93, including a 50-game home win streak from 2002 to '07.

FAN FAVORITE: F/C RONNY TURIAF (2001-05) Known for his friendly smile and his talk-to-anyone attitude, the Martinique native helped Gonzaga to 107 wins in his four seasons in Spokane. Turiaf was WCC Player of the Year as a senior in 2004-05.
